

Railroad Crossing Signs
These signs let you know when a railroad track goes across a road. It alerts you to be careful and look out for trains.



Train Station Sign
Look for this sign when you are driving with your family. It tells you where train stations are - where trains stop to pick up and drop off.



Engineer
The person who drives a train is called an Engineer or Train Operator.



Sleeping Car
On trains that go a long distance, there are cars with rooms where you can sleep - like a hotel on a train!

Passenger Car
Trains that transport people have cars where you can sit and ride. Some fancy trains have a clear roof so you can better view the scenery.



Dining Car
On short and especially long train trips there is usually a car with a restaurant inside.






Locomotive
The front of the train usually has an engine that pulls the train. It is called a locomotive or engine.

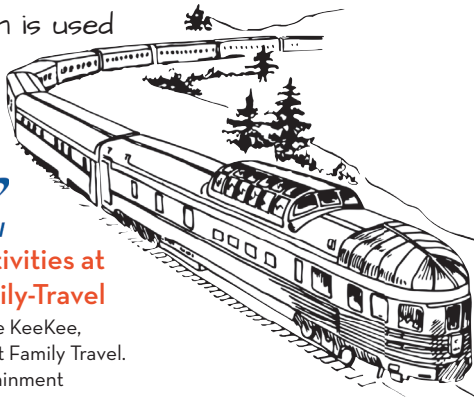
Before the invention of cars and airplanes, train travel was the best way to go long distances! Travel by train is still a popular way to see sights and travel to work and from city to city.

-  Trains are built to transport passengers or cargo along rail tracks.

-  A funicular railway features train cars that go up and down a steep hill.
-  Trains were once pulled by horses, powered by fire and steam, and now they use fuel, electricity, and even magnets.
-  A freight train is used to transport cargo instead of people.
